

LT. (jg) LESTER AUCHARD, USNR, Woodston, Kansas, was a radar officer aboard a submarine which was reported missing in June, 1945. He was awarded the Submarine Combat Insignia Medal in absentia.



LT. (jg) WARREN CALLAHAN, York, enlisted as a naval aviator (dive bomber pilot). His plane crashed in the Panama Canal Zone, June 18, 1943.



LT. ORVILLE COTNER, York, served in the Army Air Corps as a pilot of a B-17. His plane was shot down over "Berlin in February, 1945. The Purple Heart was awarded to him posthumously.

Jo these men, former students of York College, who have given their lives in the service of their country, do we dedicate the 1946 Marathon. These young men have given their Joday that we might have our Jomorrow.

COMMANDER JAMES HANNA, Riverside, Illinois. He died of illness in the South Pacific area.

LT. EUGENE SELL, Army Air Corps. His B-18A bomber crashed near Hamilton Field, California, October 24, 1941.



LT. WAYNE DAHLSTEDT, York, was killed in action with the 7th Army in Germany, March 31, 1945. He was awarded the Silver Star post-humously.



LT. WILSON GILMORE, York, enlisted in the U. S. Army Infantry Division. He was killed in action in Italy, March, 1944. The Silver Star Medal was awarded to him posthumously.



SGT. BRYCE HANNA, York, was a member of the National Guards. He was killed in the European theatre, November 16, 1944. Mrs. Hanna received the Purple Heart Citation and the Scroll signed by the President.



LT. J. T. HILTON, Mead, Colorado, was Commanding Officer of the 106th Chemical Impregnating Co. He died at Camp Sibert, Alabama, February, 1943.

LT. ROBERT OSWALD, Aurora, was a navigator on a B-24 in the Army Air Corps. His plane was shot down over Saigon, French Indo China, Tune, 1945.



LT. JOHN PETERSON, York, was a pilot of a P-47 Thunderbolt. He flew a reconnaissance mission over Germany. He was killed in April, 1945.



CAPT. FLOYD RICHERT, White Tail, Montana, was a Chaplain in the 316th Army Air Force Troop Carrier Group. His plane crashed in England, March, 1944.





LT. DEAN HITCHCOCK, Portland, Oregon, was with the Army Air Corps 439th Fighter Squadron, Tallahassee, Florida. His plane crashed at Manitou Springs, Colorado, in the summer of 1944.



LT. DONALD HITCHCOCK, Portland, Oregon, was with the Army 104th Infantry Division. He was killed in the plane crash with his brother, Dean, at Manitou Springs, Colorado, in the summer of 1944.



PFC. JOHN KEVE, St. Joseph, Missouri, died in the Cabanatwan Prison Camp, on October 18, 1942. He was buried in Luzon. He served with the Medical Unit.

CAPT. JOHN SANDALL, Lincoln, was on a B-24 in the 15th Air Corps. He served in North Africa and Italy. His plane was shot down over Munich, July 19, 1944. He was posthumously awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Bronze Medal.



ENS. GEORGE SHANEYFELT, Central City, served as Communications Officer aboard the LST 460. He went down with his ship in Philippine waters, December, 1944. He was Company Commander of his Midshipman Class. The Purple Heart was awarded to him posthumously.



SGT. ROBERT WITT, Shickley, was a member of the famed Jolly Rogers Squadron of the Air Corps, New Guinea. His plane crashed in February, 1944. He was awarded posthumously the Purple Heart and the Presidential Citation.





Early in 1943, a Greater York College Campaign took shape, and on February 23, a \$350,000 program was inaugurated, having been approved by the Board of Administration of the denomination. Bishop V. O. Weidler was appointed chairman, and Dr. S. B. Williams, executive secretary. A local merchant, Mr. F. C. Middlebrook, started the Campaign by a cash gift of \$15,000. The Greater York College Campaign was officially launched Commencement Day, 1944. Dr. J. J. Good, Indianapolis, Indiana, was chosen director and worked from July 1, until the holidays of that year. The Rev. Virgil Hague succeeded him in August, 1945.

Half of the amount was to be placed in the endowment fund; the rest was to be used for buildings and equipment. The Campaign having reached over a quarter of a million dollars, it was possible to go ahead with the plans for the first building. On December 6, 1945, a Building Committee was appointed with power to act. They were Mr. J. C. Middlebrook, chairman; Dr. G. J. Savery, secretary; Dean W. E. Bachman, Mr. E. P. Hildebrand, Mr. E. A. Levitt, Mr. E. J. Malster, Pres. D. E. Weidler, and Dr. S. B. Williams. This committee chose the Meginnis and Schaumberg Co. of Lincoln, to prepare plans, and signed the contract with them March 27, 1946. With a forward look to the future, this Campaign moves ahead.



Here is the architect's drawing of the new women's dormitory to be built on the northwest corner of the campus.








