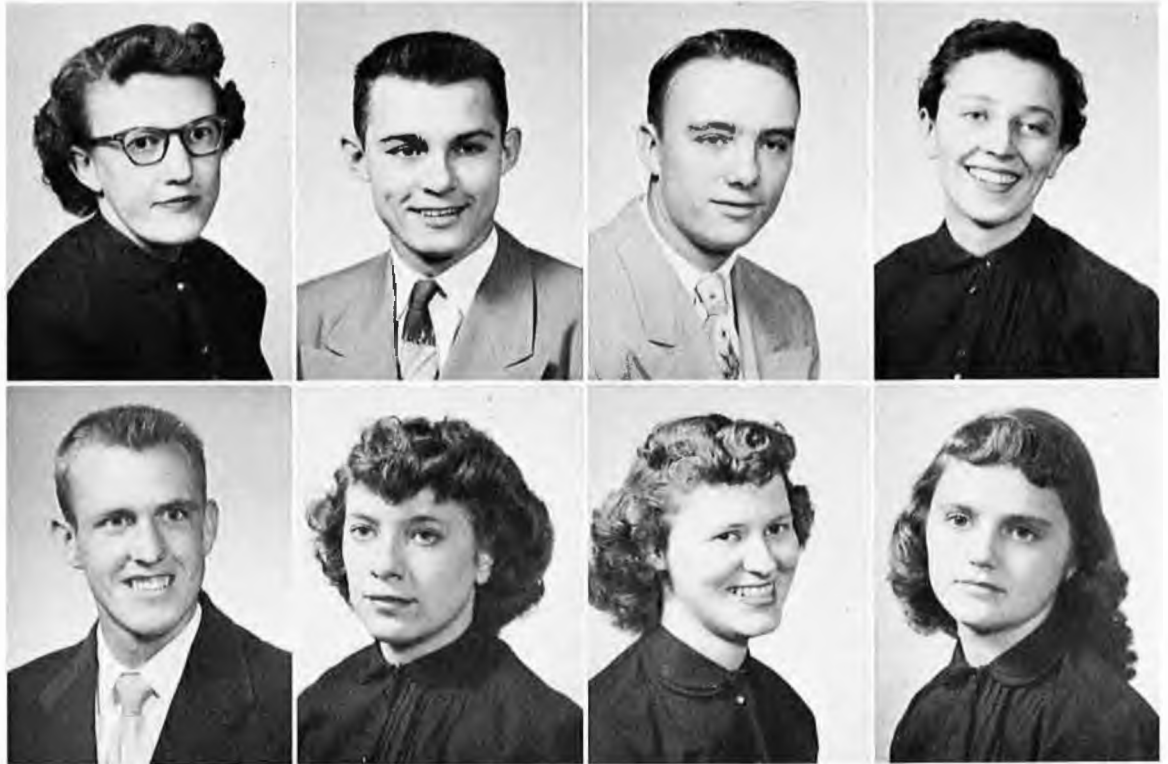

In the fourth play of the season's opener, a hard-charging Panther line blocked Downing's punt on the Quaker 20 yard line. Five plays and 98 yards later, Friends had a touchdown. With five seconds remaining in the first half, Walkemeyer made a timely interception and raced untouched for the Quaker's final score. In the fourth quarter, after blocking another Downing punt, the Panthers went on to score. Defensive standouts for York were Neidl, Glahn, and Smith. York's running attack was stymied by an impotent offensive line. All-conference end, Bud Glahn, was lost for the season with a knee injury.

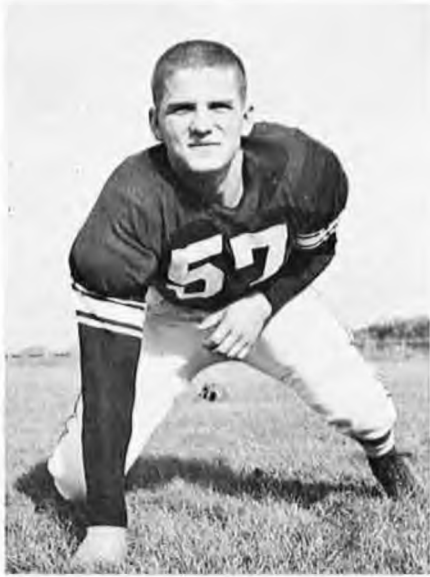
