Time is more and more rapidly bringing to a close my college career. Even now the hours are limited. In a fortnight I will find myself having finished a period of four years in college . . . years, seemingly, very short. Then the ever tautening bowstring of my college life will have spent its force. 'Twill be replaced by a bow for bigger game.

And you query, "What is the sensation of this 'last ride'?" if we compare the last few weeks of a four-year college course to an arrow being shot from a faithful bow for the last time. Almost in a balance, two powerful emotions strive for supremacy. The one exemplified in a state of sadness and gloom at being unleashed and cut adrift from college friends, clubs, athletics, etc.; the other, the one proving itself to be the stronger on the balance, offers new incentives and new fields of endeavor.

This latter force looms, not in the form of a leisurely existence nor with only an occasional obstacle, but is silhouetted like a mountainous trail having its extremes of happiness, of anxiety, and of sadness. Further, it seems to prophecy that the successes and failures to be encountered rest almost entirely upon the individual's application of himself to a given task.

'Was it worth the cost?" It is with that and similar questions that I am frequently confronted. Having worked my way through school, I find myself in a very formidable position for answering such a question. My answer is always "Yes.

No, I'm not a traveling encyclopedia of the courses that I have taken. I hold no scholarships to Harvard, Oxford, or Columbia. What have I got out of college then?

I find my horizons broadened so that my outlook on life is of a much different nature than the narrow restricted boundaries of being a high school graduate. No longer do I regard a single book as an absolute authority upon a given subject without careful investigation. The associations with fellow students in extra-curricular activities have proved the constant necessity of a life-long gettingalong with others, especially the meeting-up with varied personalities and tactfully dealing with them. My religious conceptions have been markedly influenced, and the teachings of the Christian faith, as they have constantly been set forth by my professors, have laid a foundation for the allotting of a very definite place for religious worship in my life. The knowledge gained has enabled me to appreciate literature and art, and has made it possible to gain a greater conception of the fields of endeavor in which men spend their lives. These are but a few of the benefits that I have derived from college.
