

Lt. Les Auchard Reported Missing In Pacific Area

Lt. (j.g.) Lester Auchard, U. S. N. R., '43, Woodston, Kans., has been reported as missing in action in the West Pacific Area, according to an official report received by his wife, Mrs. Ruth (Wiren) Auchard, Woodston, Kans., who is a senior at York College.

Lt. Auchard graduated from York College in June of 1943 and entered the navy the same summer. He received his officers' training at Northwestern University in Chicago. After receiving his commission, he took radar training at Harvard university and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Boston, after which he volunteered for submarine service.

While he was in submarine training in New London, Conn., his wife was with him. In Dec., 1944, after completing his training, Lt. and Mrs. Auchard returned to their home in Woodston, Kans., for a short leave. Then Lt. Auchard flew to the west coast for his overseas assignment. Since that time he has been in active duty on a submarine operating in the Pacific war zone.

With the end of the war, Mrs. Auchard has expressed her hope that some news will be received concerning her husband's safety.

A brother, Denny Auchard, second semester freshman, Woodston, Kans., recently discharged from the navy, is now attending York College.

In 1942 and 1943, Lt. Auchard was elected Representative Man of York College. He was business manager of the *Sandhurr* for two years. He lettered in football, basketball, and track and was co-captain of the football team in the fall of 1942.

Two classrooms were redecorated in the administration building during the summer months. Dr. J. C. Morgan, head of the classical languages Dept., had his room replastered and a ceiling of Celotex put on. The English classroom of Miss Edith Callender, head of the department, has new window shades.

The mathematics room was redecorated and fluorescent lighting units were added.

An array of new flowers was awaiting the students upon their

arrival. The campus improvement committee, of which Dr. G. T. Savery, pastor of the college church, is chairman, states that the flowers were given to the committee.

Miss Gladys Pearson, of the piano department, gave a number of rose plants which were placed in the garden by the south door of the administration building. Wayne Schwindt, senior of La-Crosse, Kans., gave the committee 50 tulip bulbs which will be planted in the next few weeks.

Auchard is now pastor of a mission church in St. Louis, and Phillips is with the armed forces in Berlin.

The artist, Mr. Duren, is a native of Shelby. He was so impressed by the work of the gospel team that he chose to memorialize it by portraying their activity on canvas.

This painting won a prize among the Omaha World-Herald magazine pictures. A subscription of one dollar per member was begun by the conference in an effort to purchase the picture for York college.

The citation says: "For meritorious achievement during military operations against the enemy in Mindanao, Philippine Islands, from April 17 to June 30, 1945. Sergeant Berry as chief of the meteorological section, furnished data to the corps artillery battalions. His duties required his attention at frequent intervals day and night. . . Sergeant Berry's initiative, good judgment, and energy reflect great credit to himself and the military service."

S/Sgt. Berry is with the Hq. and Hq. Btry. 10th Corps Artillery in Mindanao. He participated in the Leyte campaign and also wears a battle star for service in New Guinea.

S/Sgt. Berry is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Berry, 3066 N. Main, Hoisington, Kansas. His wife, Mrs. Daisy Million Berry, ex-'46, resides at Noel, Missouri. Before entering the service in June, 1942, he taught at the Utica high school.

The first weeks of peace included the opening of the 56th year of service for York College. During the dark days of total war we eagerly anticipated this time and were making plans for a Greater York College as our part in meeting the demands of the new day of peace. Our campaign for funds for endowment and new buildings had reached \$205,775.77 by September 12th of which \$125,178.04 was cash and U. S. savings bonds. This sum assures a new building in the near future. We are going forward in the next two years toward the securing of \$300,000.00 additional with the full approval of the General Conference of the United Brethren Church.

To lead in the campaign for this desired consummation the Board of Trustees has secured the services of the Rev. Virgil Hague, of Indianapolis, Indiana. Mr. Hague had outstanding success while working in the half-million dollar campaign of Indiana Central College. He brings this valuable experience and training to our help in the most challenging opportunity York College has ever had.

Mr. Hague was a successful pastor in the Illinois Conference in which he grew up as a son of the parsonage. He is a graduate of Indiana Central College and of Bonebrake Seminary. All alumni and friends of York College will welcome him and his family to our fellowship and help him to help us to victory.

Our new year is opening auspiciously with a 45% increase in attendance over last year at this time. We are anticipating the return of many of our service personnel to the student body. In due time we expect those of our faculty who have been on leave to return to their places in our program.

The new quarters being provided as an annex to Hulitt Hall will soon be ready. The Home Arts department is being reestablished under the capable leadership of Mrs. Mamie K. Long. The normal activities which were restricted during the war are being revived. Six-man football is leading back to a full fledged athletic program. We are on the march to the Greater York College.

The annual of this high school is the largest in the state of Nebraska.

Six-Man Football Claims Center of Y. C. Interest

Auchard And Robson Are Student Coaches Of Season

After a lapse of three years, the York Panthers will don their football togs, and for the first time in the history of the college, they will play 6-man football. The change from the 11-man to 6-man game is due to the lack of man power. Denny Auchard will be student coach during the football season, and Don Robson during the basketball season.

Auchard, second semester freshman, Woodston, Kans., recently discharged from the U. S. Naval Reserve, lettered four years in football in high school, and coached the St. Joseph football team of York in 1943 while a freshman at York college. Also just before his discharge, he was working out at the U. S. Merchant Marine Academy.

Auchard reports 21 men are turning out for regular practice. He has been putting the men through stiff workouts and reports the team to be progressing. The prospective team will average about 165 pounds.

Four games have been scheduled for the Panthers — two home games and two games away. On October 5, the Panthers will journey to Blair, where they will have their first tussle with Dana college. The first home game will be played on October 19, when the team tackles the Concordia Teachers. A return game with Concordia will be played on October 27. The last game of the season will be on Nov. 2, when Dana plays a return game on the York field. All the home games will be played

at the East Hill park.

Robson, sophomore, Thayer, lettered three years in basketball at Thayer, when Thayer was one of the top Class D basketball teams in the state. He is one of the nine returning basketball lettermen who will perform on the Panther team this coming season. The squad will face one of the heaviest basketball schedules in Y. C. history, with 18 scheduled

games.

Auchard and Robson are working under the supervision of Prof. R. E. Townsend, who has been the acting director of men's athletics during the absence of Coach Roland Tonkin. With the increase in enrollment, all three men are looking forward to a successful athletic year, and to a return to 11-man football next year.
