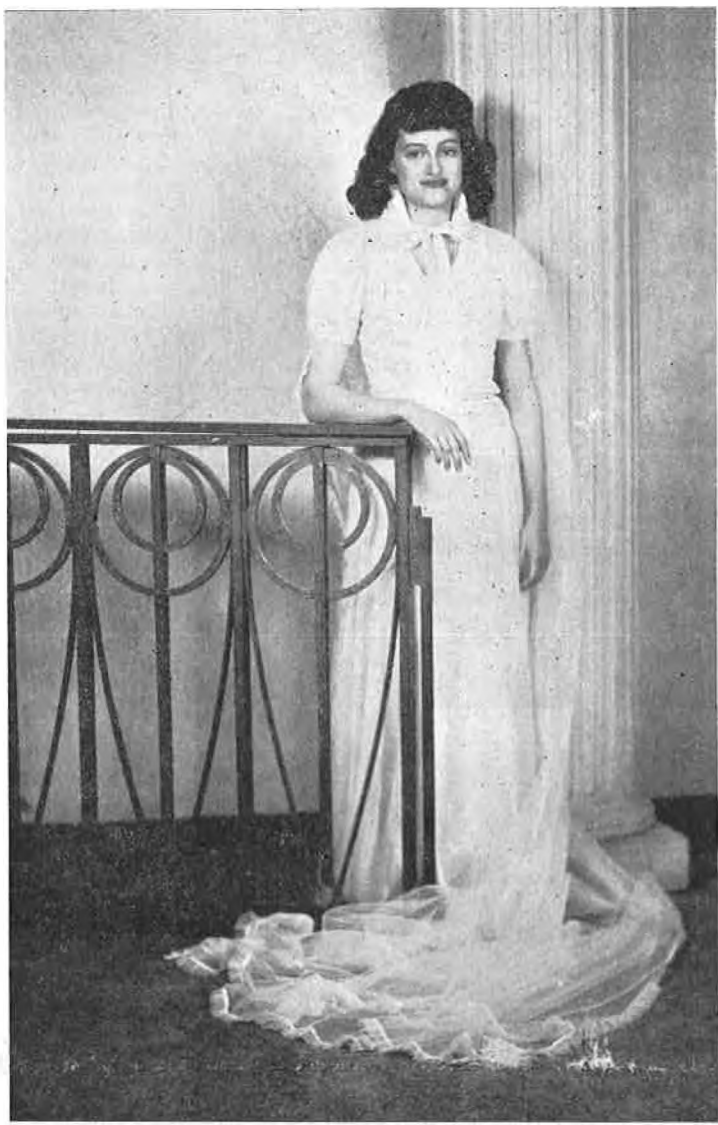
The Historic club under the direction of Miss Irene Shipley, will present the play, "How the Weather is Made" by Harold Brighouse.

### City Buses To Be Of Service To Students

The York Intra City Transit Company, which started operations of the new city bus line last Monday morning, will be of service to York College students who wish transportation to and from their homes or to and from the business district.

Temporary headquarters have been set up on the corner of Sixth street and Lincoln avenue. There are four routes leading to various parts of the city. Students wishing to board a bus may do so on the corner of 8th and Blackburn, one block west of the Conservatory.

The busses will make round trips every thirty minutes and stops will be made at points marked in white on curbs in the business section and marked with orange bus stop posts in the residential districts. Twelve adult rides will cost one dollar.

## Three Men To Receive Honorary Doctorate Degrees At Commencement

Dr. Guy T. Buswell, Rev. Paul V. Clark,

Three men are to receive honorary Doctorate Degrees at the York College commencement program May 29. The degrees, an LL.D. and two D.D.'s, are to be awarded respectively to Dr. Guy T. Buswell, Chicago, Illinois; the Rev. Paul V. Clark, Des Moines, Iowa; and the Rev. Paul B. Porter, Aurora.

Mr. Buswell received an A. B. degree from York College in 1913, a Master's Degree from the University of Chicago in 1916, and a Ph. D. from the same institution in 1920. He has taught at York College, at Hamline University of St. Paul, Minn., and at the University of Chicago where he is a professor at the present time. His work in the field of reading techniques has been outstanding and he has written several books on that subject.

The Rev. Mr. Clark has had training at several colleges and universities including Leander Clark College, Northwestern Uni-

versity, Southwestern College, Oklahoma City University, and Garrett Biblical Institute. He has served as a singing evangelist and pastor in the United Brethren Church for the past thirty-one years. He has done a great deal of work in connection with the organization of summer camps and in Christian Endeavor activities.

He is the pastor of St. Andrew's United Brethren Church in Des Moines, Iowa, at the present time.

The Rev. Mr. Porter was graduated from York College in 1915. He served as a pastor, and one year as Field Secretary for York College before going to Bonebrake Seminary. He received the B. D. degree from Bonebrake in 1923, and since that time has held pastorates in Nebraska at Merna, York, and at Aurora, his present location. Porter has served continuously in responsible positions in the Nebraska Conference and has served several years on the York College Board of Trustees.

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## History Of The Class Of 1946

The class of 1946 will be remembered as the first class to be a product of the war. When this class entered York College in Sept., 1942, it numbered 82. Of that number, eight remain. Twenty-one are graduating in this class, as thirteen have joined it during the past four years.

More students were lost to the armed forces than for any other reason. From the original number, thirty-three men and two women went into service. Some of these have already returned to the campus. Two veterans returned to complete work for a degree with this class.

Of the twenty-one, five are men. All of the five men are married. However, the women did not do so badly, as four of them are married.

True to the college tradition was this class by losing the freshmen-upperclassmen athletic contests at Homecoming. They paid their debt by presenting a mock radio program featuring Professor Whiz (Dick Riggs), Mary Lane (Ruth Auchard), and Jack Armstrong, the all-American boy (Badger Halsey).

In their sophomore reception on Jan. 21, 1944, another radio program was given. Ethel Brooke, the president, was the mistress of ceremonies. Ruth Auchard and Roberta Allen wrote a skit and presented Dale Sweetwood as the "termite." This was one of those unpredictable radio mysteries. Between acts the newly organized class trio sang a commercial "Dr. Anglenstine's Pink Pills."

In April of the same year, the sophomores planted a birch tree on the campus. Dr. Raymond J. Pool, chairman of the Department of Biology at the University of Nebraska, spoke on "The History and Importance of Arbor Day."

As juniors they were entertained by the class of '45 at a Valen-

## Panthers Place Sixth In First Nebr. College Conference Meet

### How They Scored

Peru, 47 1/2, Hastings 40 5/6, Doane 32 1/6, Chadron 30 6/6, Wayne 25 5/6, York 22, Midland 16 1/2, Kearney 16, Wesleyan 1.

The York College Panthers placed sixth in the first annual Nebraska college conference track and field meet held at Doane last Saturday. Peru won the championship as had been expected.

The Panthers scored their 22 points in the 100 yd. dash, 220 yd. dash, two-mile run, mile run, and mile relay. Panther field men failed to place in any of the field events.

Auchard scored nine points for the Panthers by nosing out Abernathy of Chadron for first in the 100 yd. dash, but scoring a second to him in the 220 yd. dash.

Jameson was close behind Auchard with eight points, winning a spectacular two-mile and a third in the mile. Dean placed a third in the 220 yd. dash and the mile relay team (Jameson, Bean, Holbrook, Robson) placed third in the relay.
