Missionary Team To Visit Campus Monday, Tuesday

A missionary team consisting of Mrs. Edward Nagel, representative of the Women's Missionary Association, Dr. Stanley B. Williams, associate secretary of Home Missions and the Church Erection Board, and Dr. C. W. Shoop, returned missionary from China, will be on the campus next Monday and Tuesday, January 21 and 22, to interview students interested in home and foreign mission service.

Mrs. Nagel is a returned missionary from the Philippines. She was sent home when the war began, but her husband, the Rev. Edward Nagel, joined the U. S. Army as a chaplain and stayed with the forces in the Philippines. He was taken prisoner and died in a prison hospital at Moji, Kyushu, Japan, last February. Mrs. Nagel is Secretary of Missionary Education for the association.

Dr. Shoop is Secretary of the Church of Christ in China, and superintendent of the work of the United Brethren Church in China.

Mrs. Nagel and Dr. Shoop will speak in chapel Monday and at a joint Y. M. and Y. W. meeting Tuesday. They will also speak to Life Work Recruits Monday night.

He listed the three major problems found there as displaced persons, housing shortage, and food shortage. Speaking of Germany, he said, "Germany has forgotten God. It is up to the thinking people of the world to bring God back to them."

Albert Kamm, '39, who spent his army life overseas in England, France, and Germany, addressed the chapel audience recently telling of the things that gave the

American soldier faith and hope of something worth living for. While in England and France, he noted the tremendous personal sacrifice going on and showed how this aids one to see how little he really is.

"We can not pray to change the will or mind of God even if we pray earnestly," began the Rev. W. J. Hague in a recent formal chapel program. He explained how a person should be changed through prayer and unless he is, he had better change his prayers. Concluding, the Rev.
