

President Weidler Writes Chapter In Book

President Weidler is writing a chapter of a biography of the late Bishop A. B. Statton. The book is to be published this fall which is the tenth anniversary of the church leader's death.

Bishop Statton began his career as a teacher in York College from 1890 to 1894. He was a bishop of the Southwest Area from 1926 to 1937.

The biography has been authorized by the late bishop's family and is being prepared by a number of his former colleagues.

AFRICAN PROJECT OVER THE TOP

"Top all other years," was the African Project goal set up by the Life Work Recruits this year. This seemed at first like a big goal but it was reached—with a big margin.

This year the student body gave \$342.80. This is \$132 more than York College has given in any other year. According to Dr. S. G. Ziegler, the highest totals until this year were \$208.90 in 1937 and \$210 in 1943.

This money, together with the money raised on other Evangelical United Brethren College Campuses and Seminaries, is used to support a student representative sent to Africa from one of these institutions every other year. Our representative this year is Miss Florence Barnhart, a graduate of Lebanon Valley this year, who will leave August 10th for Africa.

Aully Holst, sophomore, Red Wing, Minnesota, was appointed travelling student representative to Youth camps, by the faculty of York College.

Leaving York on the 8th of June, Aully has already made a tour of 3,000 miles by automobile. He has visited the following Young People's and intermediate camps: Lexington, Nebraska; Tanta Waconda, Odessa, Missouri; Webster, Salina, Kansas; Palmer Lake, Colorado (under the patronage of the Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico conferences); Cedar Bluffs, Coffeyville, Kansas.

He showed slides on York College and campus life, and answered questions relating to school work as they were put by prospective students.
