Hulitt Hall, built in 1903 as a Music Conservatory, has withstood the test of time and remains one of York College's historical landmarks and most cherished buildings. It was named after John Hulitt of Hillsboro, Ohio, who gave \$5,000 towards its construction. At the turn of the century it was noted with some importance for having electrical lights, steam heat, and city water. Remodeled in 1992, it currently houses offices and two classrooms.



# Spiritual Life Center Remodeling Needed

McGehee Hall has long been the focal point of the York College campus as well as the center of student activity. Built eight years after Hulitt Hall as a gymnasium "with the finest indoor track in Nebraska," it has undergone several transformations through the years. In its ninety-two years, it has accommodated the library, student center, science labs, faculty offices, computer center, and classrooms.

Beginning in 2004, the entire second floor will be devoted to the YC Campus Ministries as the Spiritual Life Center. Extensive renovation and remodeling have been proposed to facilitate larger gatherings of students; and a general "atmosphere overhaul" to encourage its use as a meeting place.

In honor of Mike Rush, who served as Campus Minister until his stroke in April, 2002, the class of 1984 has been challenged to raise a large portion of the needed funds. Plans are being made for a ribbon-cutting ceremony October 16, 2004, at the class's 20th-year reunion during Homecoming.

# Campus begins preparations for World Mission Workshop



Lewis is part of the coordinating board for next year's World Missions Workshop, which will be held on the York College campus. Some are apprehensive about York's ability to host such a large event, but those involved with the planning are not at all intimidated.

"We'll get everything done and we'll do it well...it will all work out with God's blessing," said Lewis. Others on the coordinating board are Carol Givens, Barbara Goodwin, Rick Eldred, Paul Robison, and Dottie Schulz. Robison, who spent seventeen years in Italy as a missionary, is the director for the 2004 workshop.

"It's a big project and everyone doing his little part is what is going to make it work," said Robison. "Even though there are a thousand details, you know there are others doing their fair share."

Though the event is a year away, some preliminary preparations have begun. Forty-five people from York attended the workshop at Lipscomb

Lewis predicts that there will be an extra 800 people on campus for the workshop. Lipscomb had about 1,200 guests, but they don't anticipate YC will draw quite as many since, "we're a bit more isolated," said Lewis. Also, York doesn't have as many congregations in the immediate area as Nashville; there are 119 churches of Christ alone in the Music City. Some of the guests will be housed in the residence halls and other buildings on campus. The church at East Hill and the community will also be asked to house guests, as there will not be enough room on campus.

"It will be so wonderful that we'll have to include the community," said Lewis. "The Western (Christian College) folks said that was one of the greatest blessings of the whole deal." WCC in Regina, Saskatchewan, has fewer than 100 students, so they had to house many of their guests with community members when the workshop was held there in 2000. In fact, it was at WCC that Mike Rush put York College into the picture by stating our willingness to host the event in 2004.

"York and the community have always had a pretty good rapport...I think the people will come through," said Robison, noting that our campus can only house about 200 extra people, and the East Hill families could take approximately 150.  $\square$

# HOLTHUS FIELD HOUSE OPENS DOORS

# JOHNSON REPEATS

# ... Again

Three times in a row, Wakefield, Neb., senior Amber Johnson rose to the top of women's Region IV golf to take the individual championship honors. Johnson, who was the 2003 MCAC Player of the Year last spring, was solid in all six of the fall season's performances, never finishing below fifth.

In her first match of the year she finished fourth out of 61 players, won the next three (taking the last of the first place finishes by seven strokes), took fifth in the Midland Invite, and then completed the season with a second place finish at the Newman Univ. Invite. Her low rounds were 77 at Mahoney G.C. in Lincoln and 78 at Terradyne Country Club in Wichita.

Head Coach Frank Chapman had only good things to say about Johnson. "Amber is really consistant," stated Chapman. "She's always going to shoot a pretty decent score." He went on to say that Johnson is probably the best player in Region IV, which consists of three conferences of more than 30 NAIA colleges and universities.

The team's highlight of the season was winning the Concordia Invitational by eight strokes. Golfers on the 2003-04 team in addition to Johnson are Andover, Kans., junior Kristin Woods; sophomore Hazley Hamm from Imperial, Neb.; and Lubbock



Tex., freshman Kyla Drake.

While Johnson is the lone senior leading the women's program, the men's team is being paced by a pair of newcomers: Raul Cortes of Aguascalientes, Mex., and Robbie Kernagis of Mesa,

Ariz. Together, these "southern" freshmen have done their part in filling the vacancies left by three graduating seniors from last

In the Hastings Bronco Invite this past September, Cortes carded a two-day total of 142 (72-70), finishing two under par, to capture the individual title, while Kernagis finished in fifth place with a 150 (78-72). This is the first time in five years of men's golf that a YC player has captured the individual title as well as finished under par.

"Raul's solid," commented Assistant Coach Bill Thomas. "He's the best golfer we've had." Thomas had high praises for



Kernagis as well, and felt that if the third and fourth players would play to their potential, the men's team would be in great shape for the spring season.  $\square$ 


# THEY CAME TO PLAY

had 37 points and 18 boards in 23 minutes of play vs. Dana College, breaking her older sister's (Misty '03) single game scoring




















# MCAC ALL-CONFERENCE HONORS





# Alumnus an Amateur Filmmaker

"People think we're out of control...but we really try to plan ahead, think things through, figure out what could go wrong," said amateur filmmaker Eric Eckert ('03).

Eckert has recently completed a 40-minute skateboarding video, featuring the talents of young skaters in Nebraska. For the skate stunt film "Havoc," Eckert spent three years compiling footage at skate parks in York, Fremont, Lincoln, Sioux City, Council Bluffs, and Omaha in search of new talent. Though some find Eckert's methods extreme and unnerving, he intends to go on making these types of films with the hope of becoming a professional skate videographer.

Eckert has had a passion for filming since childhood. "My dad used to have a camcorder when I was younger and he would let me use it." In junior high school, Eckert started to put his talents to use. "I never really had the attention span to write papers...once I asked my teacher if I could do a movie instead of a book report. I enjoyed it so much more that I didn't care about the extra work load." Soon, he was producing videos for many of his classes, as well as filming school events. In high school, the Washington County Police Department asked him to make an educational movie about speeding and drunk driving. This video was shown to his school, and is still used by the police department today.

One of his more recent films "Mann Mitt Fall" was originally created for last year's YC Film Fest. "As soon as I got it done, I knew I wanted to do something else with it," said Eckert, who also entered the film in a festival in Omaha called Hot Shops. The unique thing about the six-minute flick is that it was filmed backwards. After performing all of the motions backwards, the film was reversed to make the action play forward.

"We wanted to do it so well that hopefully, people wouldn't know that it was backwards," said Eckert, who worked on the film with YC student Sam Burleson. "It was only 6 minutes long, and it took forever!" said Eckert, explaining that he and Burleson practiced doing things backwards for two weeks, and then spent several days filming. Eckert plans to submit the video to several other festivals in California, making sure that he alerts the judges of his filming technique.

Currently, he is writing another script for a short film that asks the question "What is reality?" He also is working on editing several wedding videos, biking videos, and skating videos for others.




