

never miss the passing of an hour. Within moments, the grandfather clock standing guard in their hall sounds its deep notes; then for the next few minutes other clocks throughout the home follow with chimes and bells. keep accurate time," Lawrence chuckled. "Things like temperatures, barometric pressure all affect them. When the springs get old, the clock won't keep accurate time." and about old books and old bottles, old oil lamps and antique furniture. A visitor hardly knows where to look first. You can skim the titles of beautiful books in the antique secretary or admire the tiny oil lamps displayed on a nearby shelf or listen to the myriad of clocks ticking

all around you.

Or you could just listen to the man himself, as he tells about his life and loves.

Lawrence was born in middle Tennessee but has lived all over the United States, including in Ohio, where he went to work after World War II and met his wife. He earned graduate degrees in Bible and English, and moved to York in 1968 from Massachusetts to teach at York College. He and Ruth raised five children here. He retired in 1995, although he went back to teach Shakespeare in 1996 and also taught a semester last year. "I've been busier since I retired than ever before," he laughed.

There is much to keep him going. He owns two rental houses and has two big gardens. Each weekend he preaches in Auburn, Neb., and he has made several trips to teach in both Canada and the Ukraine. "All that and with my hobbies and keeping up with all my friends, I stay plenty busy," he said.

Oh, yes, those hobbies.

"You try to give some rational explanation for the things you do, but when you try to give a rational explanation for the things you collect, you fail miserably," he said with a smile. "Beauty appeals to me in all of its forms, and I collect what I collect for aesthetic reasons, but I also collect books for the intellectual stimulation. I'll probably never live long enough to read all of them, but I keep working at it."

His interest in clocks was piqued by one he received from Ruth's grandfather. The sentimental object set him off on a lifetime of collecting. "Such marvelous craftsmanship went into these old clocks. Not just in their cases, but their works, their mechanisms, and that just intrigued me. I appreciate craftsmanship wherever it's found," he said.

"The 'tall case' or 'hall clocks' are commonly called Grandfather clocks today," he pointed out, suddenly breaking into poetry.

"My grandfather's clock was too large for the shelf, So it stood 90 years on the floor.

It was taller by half than the old man himself, Though it weighed not a penny weight more."



elly Holthus, President and CEO of Cornerstone Bank N.A. in York is the campaign national chairman. His leadership and commitment to the mission of York College have been invaluable through the years and are part of our rich heritage.

espite freezing temperatures and wind-driven snow flurries, enthusiastic crowd of York College friends, faculty and staff, lents and donors were warmed by the announcement by Kelly Holthus of a campaign for York College. Mr. Holthus, the campaign national chairman, announced Phase I of a decade-long campaign, "Securing the Vision: A Call to Excellence." Holthus said the \$7.6 million goal "includes funds for facilities, scholarships, faculty and staff development, campus beautification and endowment." Holthus commended participants in the quiet phase of the campaign for having already committed more than \$3.6 million of the projected goal. The Board of Trustees and the faculty and staff have

committed more than at any time in York's history.

The events of the day were highlighted by an announcement by President Wayne Baker of gifts from the local community totaling more than \$1.1M, including a gift from the York Community Foundation made possible through the Mincks Estate, and a major gift from the Holthus family. In recognition of the gift from the Holthus family, the audience was treated to the unveiling of a new indoor athletic practice facility, the Holthus Field House, named in honor of Mr. Holthus' family, including his wife Virginia and children Kendell, Kris, Beth and Tom.

The 35,000 square-foot sports practice facility is scheduled


to be completed in the spring. The design of the building will reflect some of the same characteristics of "other York College buildings," President Baker explained. "We want it to look as much like the Mackey Center and Hulitt Hall as possible."

Baker said the steel structure will have a brick front and 30-foot side walls. The entire facility will be completely open and the surface will be covered with Astroturf. Chris Luther, York College's athletic director, expressed his excitement for the project and shared the feeling of the coaching staff who will "now have an indoor alternative for practice during inclement weather."

Inside will be practice facilities for soccer, baseball, softball, golf, track and field, and student intramural programs. There will also be an elevated track, restrooms, and athletic office space.

At the ground breaking ceremony for the Holthus Field House came the announcement of a decade-long campaign, "Securing the Vision: A Call to Excellence." \$3.6 million has already been committed towards the \$7.6 million goal in Phase I.
